



100 Years of SG





Supreme Court







Academic Liaison Council

Redesigned the FLC program curriculum to prepare students for leadership roles across campus and to be used as a case study by Dr. Heather Stevens



FLC members participated in workshops covering a wide range of topics, including understanding leadership styles, student programming 101, navigating failure, and the power of mentorship



All students were placed in one of four subcommittees (Logistics, Sponsorship & Finance, Marketing & Outreach, Hospitality & Assessment) to put on the annual LAUNCH Leadership Summit—applying all soft skills acquired throughout the year into practice

Partnered with Eco Agency, PERIOD, and 100 Strong to maintain the garden next to the business school, package over **400** peanut butter and jelly sandwich meals, and assemble **80** period packages, all of which were delivered to the Miami Rescue Mission.

Organized the largest De-Stress Fest to date in collaboration with AGLO and COPE, with additional partnerships. The event featured free sweatshirts, Playa Bowls, Chipotle, pizza, a photo booth and various giveaways.

ECO continues to be the leading force of environmentalism and sustainability on campus to better the University of Miami as a whole and our environment. ECO's vision is to build an environmentally friendly campus, promote green habits and engage with the greater South Florida community on important environmental issues.

This year ECO...

- World Recycling Day: An interactive and education-based tabling event to teach students how to use the aluminum can recycling machine located in the food court
- Business School Canal Trail Maintenance: in partnership with Outreach's Day of Service and in preparation for mangrove planting and the installation of a solar bench, ECO re-mulched and weeded the green space near the business school canal and added new pollinator plants
- Butterfly Garden Maintenance:
 Removed non-native pollinators
 from Eco's garden near Knight
 Physics building and replaced
 them with native varieties that
 would better support pollinators
 - The Eco Reps installed a Generation Conscious Laundry Sheet dispenser in the InstaMart next to Starbucks. This sheet offers free laundry sheets for students which are a more environmentally friendly alternative to traditional detergent options
